(Industrial, Branch 2)
(T.Q.A.A., voluntary certified trade)

WORK DESCRIPTION

What would I be doing?

Industrial Painters and Decorators prepare surfaces and apply paint to interior and exterior surfaces of factories, storage tanks, bridges, towers and other industrial buildings and structures. They perform some or all of the following duties:

- prepare and clean surfaces using methods such as scraping, sanding, sand-blasting, hydro-blasting, and steam-cleaning,
- mix paint to obtain desired colour and texture,
- apply paint or other materials, such as fibre glass, metal coating, or fire retardant using brushes, rollers or spray equipment,
- provide cost estimates.

The work often involves lifting and carrying heavy objects, such as ladders. Physical fitness with strong upper body combined with agility and a comfort working at heights are an asset. A five day work week of 35 to 40 hours is standard.

PLACE OF WORK

Who needs an Industrial Painter or Decorator?

- painting contractors,
- building maintenance contractors,
- large plants, industrial settings,
- manufacturing facilities
- they may be self-employed

CONDITIONS OF WORK

An Industrial Painter Decorator is a voluntary certified trade. A person does not have to have a valid Certificate of Qualification to work in the trade but being registered as an apprentice is recommended. Under TQAA, for **voluntary** trades, the Cooperative Education student does not have to be a registered apprentice and therefore does not have to be paid during school hours. **Students who become registered apprentices may be paid** according to the Regulations.

SALARIES/WAGES

The salary of the Painters and Decorators depends on the employer. In unionized places the wages and conditions of work are negotiated collectively. The rate of wages for an apprentice is a specified percentage of a journeyperson's wage according to experience and level of training.

In the Elgin, Middlesex and Oxford area, Painters and Decorators can earn \$ 12.92 - \$ 20.35 per hour, averaging \$ 17.64 per hour.

PROSPECTS of EMPLOYMENT in the Elgin, Middlesex and Oxford area

RATING: *fair*

The Painter and Decorator trade relies greatly on the economy. At the present time there is a shortage of Apprentices to replace the skilled retirees.

APPRENTICESHIP IN THE PAINTER AND DECORATOR TRADE, BRANCH 2

- takes about 2 ½ - 3 years or about 5 400 h, including 720 h of post secondary in-school training; prior education and experience may shorten the time to complete all the competencies,
- must complete the terms of the Apprenticeship Contract to receive a Certificate of Apprenticeship,
- there is no Certificate of Qualification in this trade,
- Interprovincial Trade Certification (Red Seal) is not available in this trade.

In-School Education:

An OYAP student must be 16 years old and have completed Grade 10 (or equivalent). Otherwise, Grade 10 is the minimum requirement, however, completion of Grade 12 (OSSD) is advantageous. The following competencies are valuable:

English,	<i>Communication and</i>
Mathematics,	<i>good colour sense,</i>
Art	<i>good hand-eye</i>
	<i>coordination</i>

Construction Technology

OYAP students must be full-time students in high school and those who obtain apprenticeships will complete the apprenticeship curriculum in college or an approved Training Delivery Agent.

Specific skills learned in school are: safety, applied trade calculations, hoisting

signals. Erecting and taking down scaffolding, mixing paints, use of painting and decorating equipment, surface preparation.

On the Job Training

- As a high school Cooperative Education credit (towards O.S.S.D.), learning is connected to one of the school subjects.
- The Apprentices must follow a program in the **Apprenticeship Training Standards** book which is given to them in the workplace when they register. As each competency is achieved the employer signs it off.

OPPORTUNITY TO GROW

A Certificate as a journeyman is not needed to start working as a Painter and Decorator but a registration in the apprenticeship is recommended. Once the apprenticeship is completed, a journeyman may:

- become a foreperson or a supervisor,
- start own business,
- work in related areas or occupations.
